Stewardship Considerations

Recently Congress has provided folks who receive required minimum distributions (RMDs) from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) a means to make direct contributions to charity and potentially save money on taxes.

IRA owners who are 70½ or older are generally required to receive distributions from their IRAs and now they can direct up to \$100,000 of their IRA distributions to charity. The money given to the charity counts toward the donor's required minimum distribution, but doesn't increase the donor's adjusted gross income (AGI), and is not reported as taxable on the tax return.

An individual that makes contributions but who cannot use them in full as an itemized deduction would benefit from taking these steps. Also, keeping the income out of the donor's AGI is important because doing so (1) helps the donor qualify for other tax breaks (for example, having a lower AGI can reduce the threshold for deducting medical expenses; (2) reduces taxes on the donor's Social Security benefits, and (3) helps the donor avoid a high-income surcharge for Medicare Part B and Part D premiums (which kick in if AGI is over certain levels). Unfortunately, this tax provision is only available if you have a RMD and not for everyone who is receiving IRA payments. However, if this does apply, we hope you will follow up with your tax advisor or contact Kevin Kennedy for more information. Ω

Bev Murdough discussed Camp Sentinel, a Christian overnight and day camp in Tuftonboro, for ages 5-15. She will have details at the next meeting for the group to consider.

While enjoying dessert, the group had their book exchange and the new Program Guide was distributed.

Next month's meeting will be held February 14 at 6:30 p.m., with hostesses Diane Vaughan and Nella Hobson. "Hearts and Flowers" is the theme, and items for the Diaper Pantry would be appreciated. Wednesday work meetings begin again February 1, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the vestry. All ladies are welcome. Ω
